A Helping Hand to the MAANZ Symposium

'Arts Assist - A Helping Hand' - The Small Grants Program



I must be one of the first people to apply for this grant. It was announced at the AGM this year and I applied for it as soon as I returned home.

The Mosaic Association of Australia and New Zealand (MAANZ) runs a symposium biannually. In 2017, four Bbaa members attended the program in Hobart and in 2019, five of us went to Canberra. The pandemic closed the 2021 symposium but there was a two-day online event in 2022. It was not quite the same.

In 2024 the event was to be held in Geelong, and it was to be the biggest extravaganza of them all. Held over four days, in four separate venues, eleven guest speakers from ten different countries, three separate exhibitions, twelve different workshops, (mostly run by international mosaicists), quiz night, and a vendor's market including demonstrations of the latest tools.

There was space for 500 attendees, and it was already booked out by the time the grant was announced. But I had great confidence, so I applied for the grant and put my name on some waiting lists. Sure enough, a couple of cancellations came along, and I got a ticket to the

symposium and an entry to the David Jack workshop, precision cutting.

Some of the things I learnt were that the use of both smalti and marble, together with some natural stone are still the choice of most of the acknowledged master mosaicists. There has been an increase in the number of people using stained glass as tesserae. Very few of the entries in any of the exhibitions used ceramics of any sort, except maybe cinca and no one used any glass tiles. Bark, twigs, matches, beach debris, clay and other unusual materials were all used.

There has also been a rise in interest in micro mosaics. People doing this make their own filati (very long, very thin glass threads) out of left over smalti chips. Using a blow torch, they melt the smalti and then pull it out somehow like toffee makers. These long threads are snipped to make micro tesserae.

And finally, I learnt how to pronounce interstices, (known in the Bbaa mosaic group as the grout lines) How you place your interstices is the secret to all good mosaics.

Like everything else, the cost of attending the event had increased significantly. Without the small grants program, it would not have been possible for me to go. I'd like to extend my thanks to the Bbaa COM for making this chance available and I'd encourage anyone else within the Bbaa to take advantage of this opportunity.

Bookings are underway now for 2026. If you are interested in having an exhibition with us please contact me or Kathleen Kendall.



Artist Profile: Georgia Robinson

I've been painting for as long as I can remember. I used any excuse to draw or paint something! My mother is also a painter, which solidified my passion and interest from a very young age. Growing up, I would always take my mum's *Jo Sonja* paints. I now have these paints 20 years later and still use them!

I took visual arts as a subject throughout my entire schooling, and always knew it would be very important to me to pursue it once high school had ended. I have just completed my Bachelor of Fine Arts (Painting) degree at the University of Melbourne/Victorian College of the Arts. This has been a phenomenal experience, which has given me the space and encouragement to develop as a young artist. Some of my mentors throughout the course included Darren Sylvester, Nadine Christensen, Irene Hanenbergh, Raafat Ishak, Christopher L.G Hill, Darren Munce and more.

Throughout my formal schooling I have been drawn to artists who are passionate about an environment and the energy of a place. As a result, among my favourite works are Monet's 'Water Lilies' series, Mary Tonkin's 'A

scream, Kalorama', William Robinson's 'Sunset, flying fox and beyond'. Each of the three artists are highly skilled painters, who capture the essence of being in nature.

Over the last few years, I've been working predominantly with acrylic paint. I'm drawn to how bright the colours can be and how the quick drying time allows for layering in my paintings. In saying that, I love the luscious look of oil paints and am slowly learning to use both.

My work is abstracted landscapes or botanical studies. They are not still life images, but more an appreciation of a plant or ecology I have found. I'm always drawn to using bright colours and layering in different opacities.

Most of my inspiration comes from being in nature. I am constantly searching for the moments when I am excited by something, such as a speck of colour that catches my eye or the sunlight hitting wet leaves or grass.

I often go on site recording day trips around West Gippsland, to sketch, take photos and record audio. This has become an active archive of media, which is paired with trip details I write using my typewriter. My favourite place to gain inspiration is the Robinhood Reserve in Drouin. I love taking my easel or going for a walk around the track. It has been such an amazing place to spend time in over the colder months, where I have come across the most spectacular fungi.

I also do a lot of research and have engaged with texts suggested throughout my degree very deeply. I undertook two classes that have left a lasting impression on me, one being solely on plants with Tessa Laird, and the other, Collective Flowers with Geoffrey Robinson. These subjects broadened my knowledge of plants and how theory and site recording can be used to create meaningful work.

Before commencing a painting, I always start with a feeling, or desire to paint a specific place or plant. It's really important to me that I do not touch the plants or disrupt the natural rhythm it is in. I would never cut or remove something for the perfect painting.

This is often followed by taking a photograph, sometimes printing that, and taking the image to the studio.


Sometimes I sketch the composition in a book, to practise the forms, or other times, I just roughly draw the image onto the canvas or board. I can often tell as soon as my pencil hits the surface if the painting will be successful or not. My painting process is done in a changing tempo. From quick, layers of colour, to adding fine detail in slowly.

I have recently started adding oil paint glazes to my complete works and really enjoy the glowing and shiny effect it adds to an otherwise matte finish.

Over the last three years I have been involved in a number of group shows in Melbourne. This includes the VCA Artspace, Joseph Buoys Cafe, an exhibition in a shed in Flemington. I was a member of a group show titled 'Reimagining Landscapes', which was in collaboration with the Grainger Museum Creative Research Residency program. This show featured work from both First Nations and non-Indigenous artists and musicians, as we responded to the museum's research on what the landscape of Melbourne looked like prior to colonisation.

My biggest goal is to have my first solo show, which is going to be in 'The Station Gallery', Yarragon, in February.

My other goal is to save up to do a research trip or artist residency interstate. I think I am very fond of our little world in West Gippsland but I know travelling through this beautiful country will widen my artistic vocabulary. It would also mean I could engage with new plants, environments and perspectives.

Artist Profile: Alex Rojas

I don't remember a specific time when I first realized that art was for me because I have always been interested in it.

I enjoy reading about art history and I have developed an appreciation for modern art with a specific focus on pop art. An Australian artist, David Bromley, inspires me, in particular his portraits of children, birds, and butterflies.

I also look to Spanish artists for inspiration, such as Goya, who captures the real emotions and characteristics in portraits and Sorolla for bright colours and bold brush strokes.

Oils and acrylics are my two favourite mediums, with oils in summer and acrylics in winter. It's hard to pinpoint my style, but I like to incorporate a lot of bright colours and a touch of impressionism.

Initially, when I began painting, it was classic landscapes but that lasted only a short time. Gradually, my style has shifted towards figurative painting. Through my artistic journey, I have had many mentors, from art teachers to friends who have taught me so much.

I do occasionally exhibit. The most recent was 'Art in the Street' in Warragul, hosted by the Baw Baw Shire in 2023. I also exhibit at local art group exhibitions. In 2023 I exhibited at the Noble Park Community Centre Art Show and out of 590 paintings I received the second prize, "Noble Park Public Trust Runner Up Open Category" for my portrait of Dorothy from the Wizard of Oz. This gave me a great sense of accomplishment.

The process I use to complete a figurative painting involves a number of steps. I take several pictures with various angles to create the best composition. Although this is not always the case, I keep trying and hope that another new style will emerge with more ideas and perhaps use another medium, like watercolours!

Third Edition: CATCHMENT - Poetry of Place

If you had to cast a ballot to decide what the most important square in the calendar would be, in December, as far as Bbaa members are concerned, then Christmas Day might just win the vote... And then of course there's Christmas Eve. Along with Boxing Day. As well as New Year's Eve... But, if we let prize winners extend to fifth place, then 21 December would deserve an Honourable Mention, not only as the Southern Summer Solstice, but also for being the launch date for Edition 3 of Catchment - Poetry of Place...

The third instalment of this respected literary journal is set to go live online on that day, through the Baw Baw Arts Alliance website, thanks to tremendous work by the IT team, Mike & Marlene Ogden.

As editor, Rodney Williams has likewise been working hard on choosing & presenting poems for inclusion in the third edition, after encouraging poets from across Australia to contribute pieces which show a sense of location, either in this country or overseas.

Around 75 poets from different states and territories have made submissions this time, with just under 60 offering longer pieces, plus more than 30 contributing tanka (bearing in mind that some poets provide work in both genres). A range of websites remain supportive by posting notices which make Australian writers aware of this chance to submit poetry of place, in two styles: longer work (as Western free verse); and/ or tanka (as Japanese-style poems in English). Feedback about poems published has been very positive indeed.

Jennifer Fell continues to give Rodney tremendous assistance in reviewing longer work for inclusion, after helping to promote submissions.

Jo McInerney is also greatly appreciated for giving him invaluable help with selecting tanka for online publication.

One extra dimension which makes Rodney Williams all the happier - as the contributing editor with Catchment - is that other activities promoted by the Arts Alliance have played a significant part in encouraging poets to offer pieces of writing, helping to add a Gippsland-based flavour.

Members of the drop-in writing group which he conducts - Time to Write - have again contributed; while Poetry Bauhaus - convened by Yvette Stubbs - has also resulted directly in submissions. Rodney remains grateful to Sue Murphy, for her ongoing backing for the journal; as well as to the Bbaa committee overall, for continuing to show support for writing as a field of creative endeavour. 


